Honoring Service, Remembering Sacrifice: The End of the Vietnam War's 50th Anniversary Commemoration



As the nation concludes its 13-year commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the Vietnam War, WPSN joins Americans across the country in reflecting on this significant milestone.

The United States Vietnam War Commemoration, which began in 2012 and concludes this Veterans Day, has provided an important opportunity to honor the service and sacrifice of Vietnam veterans and their families.

The Vietnam War remains one of the most complex chapters in American history. Between 1955 and 1975, nearly 3 million Americans served in Vietnam. More than 58,000 made the ultimate sacrifice, and over 300,000 were wounded. For decades after their return, many veterans faced challenges receiving the recognition and support they deserved.

This commemoration period has sought to rectify that oversight, with thousands of events nationwide thanking and honoring Vietnam veterans and their families.

Communities large and small have hosted ceremonies,

parades, and educational programs to ensure that the service of these veterans is properly acknowledged and their stories preserved for future generations.

As part of the commemoration, Congress authorized the Vietnam Commemoration to recognize all who served on active duty at any time during the "Vietnam War period." While there is no definitive start date nor end date, the legislation designated 1 November 1955 (the official designation of Military Assistance Advisory Group-Vietnam (MAAG-V)) until 15 May 1975 (the end of the last official battle of the Vietnam War, precipitated by the seizure of the SS Mayaguez) as the official recognition time period.

No distinction is made between veterans who served incountry boots-on-the-ground, in-theater, or who were stationed elsewhere during the Vietnam War period. Living U.S. Veterans who served on active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces at any time during the period from November 1, 1955 to May 15, 1975, regardless of location, are eligible to receive a lapel pin.

Our own community includes many Vietnam veterans whose courage and commitment exemplify the highest ideals of service. Their experiences during and after the war have shaped not only their lives but also our understanding of sacrifice, resilience, and the true cost of conflict.

The West Point Society of Naples has been proud to serve as a Commemorative Partner with the National Commission in the 50th Anniversary Commemoration of the Vietnam War. We focused primarily on recognizing those graduates and others who are not normally found in the American Legion, VFW, or other such activities. Through this initiative, our Society has recognized almost 400 Vietnam Veterans in multiple events within the society and throughout the community.

Special thanks goes to Pete Lilly '70 who initiated this endeavor and has served as Chairman, as well as to Ron Rezek '64 who led multiple outside events.

As we mark the conclusion of this formal commemoration, we recognize that our obligation to honor these veterans does not end. Rather, it continues as we preserve their stories, support their ongoing needs, and ensure that future generations understand the lessons of this pivotal period in our nation's history.


Spring Luncheon

Austin Henning is a 2021 graduate of Barron Collier High School and entered the United States Military Academy that summer. Of note, during his first three years at the Academy, his Sponsor was LTC Andy Bryant, the FA Branch Rep, who happened to be from Fort Myers.



Following Plebe year and Cadet Field Training at Camp Buckner, Austin participated in the "Shakespeare Across England" Academic Individual Advanced Development (AIAD) in line with his academic major. This AIAD introduced Austin to the depth of Shakespeare's writing and the impact it has had on English literature.

His intramural endeavors spanned the gamut from Funky Fitness to Ultimate Frisbie to Soccer and Flag Football. Austin was heavily involved in the Student Conference on US Affairs (SCUSA) all four years. He attended the National Conference on Ethics in America which focuses on ethical leadership. As a reminder of his SWFL home, he also participated in the Fishing Club.

During his Cow summer, Austin was a Beast Squad Leader. He also graduated from Air Assault School. During the academic year, he was the First Sergeant for the Brigade Headquarters Company, and later his company Public Affairs NCO. He started this academic year as the company store officer. His culminating cadet duty assignment was as Company Commander, Company G3.

Last summer, following Cadet Leadership Development Training (CLDT), Austin's Field Artillery CTLT was actually with the 1st Battalion 509th Infantry, the OPFOR Battalion for the Joint Readiness Training Center (JRTC) at Fort Johnson, LA. It was a tremendous experience spending the JRTC rotation with the Recon Platoon and conducting various missions – all in the field.

Having the FA Branch Rep as his sponsor, Austin got his first choice in branching Field Artillery. His first assignment will be in the 18th Field Artillery Brigade, Fort Bragg. He is hoping for an Airborne slot within the brigade.

Obtaining Senatorial, Congressional, and Presidential nominations, he entered West Point in 2021 joining the Class of 2025.



Isaac participated in Sandhurst all four years. Other intramural sports included ultimate frisbee and team handball. During Cow year, he was involved with the Scoutmaster's Council.

Following Plebe year and the summer's Cadet Field Training, Isaac participated in an Academic Individual Advanced Development (AIAD) in the Czech Republic, consistent with his Major in International Affairs. The next summer, he participated in a STEM AIAD working with middle-schoolers in Seattle, Washington and Boise, Idaho. Last summer, following Cadet Leadership Development Training (CLDT), Isaac had a third AIAD in Croatia working with the Defense Attaché in the American Embassy.

During Cow Summer, he was the Assistant S-4 for the Beast 2 Detail. During the academic year, Isaac was a Squad Leader and the Company Physical Development NCO. His Firstie year, he served as a Platoon Leader, Company Standards Officer, and Company Physical Development Officer.

For his Capstone Project, Isaac went to the INDOPACOM Headquarters in Hawaii to present his research on the Chinese influence in infrastructure projects in the Pacific through China's Belt and Road initiative and its impact on US relationships. He presented his findings during Project Day.

Isaac's Cadet Troop Leader Training (CTLT) was with an Infantry battalion in 1st Brigade Combat Team, 1st Armored Division at Fort Bliss, TX. This experience confirmed his branch preference for Air Defense. Upon graduation, following Basic Officer Leader Course (BOLC), he will be assigned to the 2d Battalion, 43d Air Defense Artillery, 11th ADA Brigade, Fort Bliss, TX.

Highlights of West Point's Academic Pillar – Projects Day

West Point's Projects Day Research Symposium showcased more than 400 research projects by over 1,000 cadets across all thirteen of the Dean's Academic Departments, the Department of Military Instruction, and the Department of Physical Education! USMA welcomes and celebrates over 80 external partners and West Point faculty who contributed to these cadet-led projects.

West Point's Projects Day Research Symposium, April 24, 2025 Highlights of Southwest Florida Cadets Projects

Cadet Anthony Tinerella '25 was part of a team looking at the Army Corps of Engineers Lock and Dam Modernization of our National Critical Infrastructure. Working with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers as it modernizes the century-old hydraulic infrastructures supporting navigation on the nation's inland waterways, an essential mode of transportation of raw materials and finished products for America's Defense Industrial Base, they looked at an expanded navigation lock on the Ohio River, which will improve the capacity of the lock and facilitate trade and transport of critical resources.

Cadet Imani Christian '25 and her team's project was entitled "Blackout SLAM" for the Simultaneous Localization And Mapping using Non-Light-Emitting Sensors For Covert Operations. Today, the current night vision technology allows enemy forces to detect light across the visible and infrared spectrum, which hinders the ability to remain covert when using light-emitting sensors to conduct reconnaissance operations. They addressed this by utilizing an open-source state-of-the-art localization and mapping technique that uses non-light emitting sensors. This work reduces the risk of friendly casualties when conducting reconnaissance missions by allowing soldiers to use an unmanned means to gain insight about enemy and unfamiliar terrain.



Cadet Isaac Lewis '25 was part of an INDOPACOM sponsored effort to conduct an analysis of foreign developed infrastructure on political influence. Specifically, they looked at China's Belt and Road Initiative vis-à-vis US humanitarian assistance. The team actually flew to Hawaii to brief the INDOPACOM Deputy Commander and staff prior to Projects Day. Although sponsored by INDOPACOM, the project and its results has equal applicability to AFRICOM and SOUTHCOM.



Highlights of Southwest Florida Cadets Projects

Cadet Kelli Ahlquist '25 focused on the Cultural Destruction During Wartime in Aleppo, Syria since the Syrian Civil War in 2011 using geospatial imagery and open-source intelligence. Revealing these patterns enable the prioritization of humanitarian assistance and reconstruction efforts in a postwar environment.

Cadet Liam Holston '25 was involved in two different team projects:

- -- The geographic assessment of the operational environment of Jakarta, Indonesia assessed Jakarta using the environmental matrix as a framework to determine the most significant factors that could impact US forces participating in a humanitarian assistance/ disaster relief (HA/DR) operation. This was telling in that much of the city's population density resides in areas actually below sea level.
- -- As part of a team who all branched Infantry, they looked at the future of Al-driven Drone swarms. Their project touched on several critical evolving operational issues. Engaging one drone is difficult, but a swarm of 20 or more is another matter. Totally autonomous AI driven drones (launch and forget) may not differentiate between hostile or civilian. There is also the practical cost analysis where we have seen relatively inexpensive drones used in the Ukraine. Yet, our systems for countering such a threat are in the hundreds of thousands of dollars - clearly un-sustainable.



Cadet David Liu '26 in an independent study developed a concept for increasing the range of small unmanned aerial systems (drones) such as a quadcopter model by the incorporation of dropwing. The project is endorsed by SOF AT&L (US SOCOM Acquisition, Technology & Logistics).

Cadet Aravind Rajeev '27 continued his research on the use of a RNA virus to characterize immune suppression to improve therapeutic strategies in vaccine development. They are using Porcine Respiratory and Reproductive Syndrome Virus (PRRSV) as the model virus, applying an assessment of innate immune suppression for emerging infectious disease on the battlespace in order to protect the force in novel therapeutic strategies.

Cadet John Charles Ferrante '27 focused on the discovery of a small molecule pan-serotype Flavivirus antiviral drug to treat the Warfighter operating in austere environments. This research aims to synthesize a library of small molecules of the scaffold through a three-step synthetic pathway and then measure their efficacy in functional assays. Charles will continue his research at Walter Reed this summer as an Academic Individual Advanced Development (AIAD).
